



Hello Pop-Pickers!!! Here we are again, ready to keep you up-to-date with whats going on in the Joneses camp.

Since our last point of contact back in June to you, it may seem as though Jesus Jones have not really been up to very much in particular. However, through interviews and for some, The Slough Festival, in the U.K (a full report from Iain follows) you've managed to get an incling of whats been occuring.

Back in August Mike and Gen were invited by Peter Gabriel (no less) to take part in the 'Real World Project'. This is where, for a fortnight, musicians from all over the world join together and pool their varied musical talents, with the aim of putting some tracks together. More recently, another invitation - this time for Mike and Iain - from Bon Jovi. EH?? As the British music press seem to have reported this with most of the facts wrong, here is the official, well, horses mouth (Mikes) version of how and why this seemingly bizzare situation arose in the first place....Perhaps its U2's influence, or perhaps a turn in the weather in New Jersey, but someone in America suggested to Bon Jovi that his Bazzidity the Baker and I do that re-mix thing on the next Bon Jovi single 'Keep The Faith'. This struck us as being deeply strange, and so of coarse we accepted immediately. The original also struck us as unusual, in that it sounded, initially, not unlike EMF's 'I Believe'. So, with our audio scalpels, hacksaw, scissors and paste, we operated on the patient and withdrew from the carnage one rather funked up, remodelled Bon Jovi song and its deranged offspring, a mix twice as fast as the original that features JON BON JOVI squeaking an octave above his usual voice and some Techno Acidity at Warp factor 9. What Bon Jovi will think of it should be interesting. Deeply strange, hopefully.

What with still no record releases from Jesus Jones from your letters I realise that some of you may be growing impatient and that most of you are wondering what on earth is taking our heroes so long to get this third album finished and in the shops. So I put the question to Mike....

6TH AUGUST '92.

Eighteen months ago I started writing this album in the back of a tour bus travelling through Sweden. Last week I was still writing it, in London. The amazingly overdue album has one day of recording and one day of mixing left and then nine weeks of eating pizza, getting little sleep and a studio tan is finished. I think.

It feels a bit like the last day of school.

The making of this album has been very different from the previous two. Its taken longer and more songs have been written during the making of it than during 'Doubt' or 'Liquidizer'; but the main difference is the way we've used computers almost entirely throughout the construction of it. That is, from my writing, to the rest of the band playing their stuff onto floppy disc which the producer and I then put onto tape after we've sorted through it. Sounds like a strange way to make music? I agree, but it really works and makes for a bit of originality. Its also an important part of the idea for this album being about the blossoming of the age of the computer, the influence on all our lives. How will we play it live? None of us are totally sure yet, but if you heard the new songs in Texas, New York or Slough, you'll have an idea.



Work on the album has been split into two or three week sections of recording then mixing. 'Zeroes And Ones' was the first song, started way back at the end of May. Since then we've recorded thirteen others. It doesn't look like we'll be short of singles, the most obvious contender being 'The Right Decision', the sort of ultra pop song I didn't think I'd be writing on this album. There's some controversey over 'Phoenix' the only out and out Techno song, as the record company aren't sure if its too tokenistic for the album. There'll be some heated arguments over that!

As just twelve songs will make the final cut, something has to be relegated to B-side status and its going to be a hard choice. We've got the fast thrashy songs, the slow and quiet ones, some with a strong Techno influence, some computer-twisted rock songs and probably a kitchen sink somewhere.

Obviously, few if any of these song titles are going to mean much to you until the release date which at the moment is in the frustratingly distant January. If only you could hear them now!

So it seems in essence, the album, as yet untitled, is finished. However, there's still much to be done on the production and promotional side of things before its release. Still no touring plans officially confirmed. So it looks like 1993 is going to be THE year for everything Jones like!!!
